

or public TV producer/reporter/ Donna Trewhella, KCVR's "I.E. Scene" is an opportunity to meet interesting people and learn more about local organizations. So when she heard about Angel View, she immediately contacted PR Director DeAnn Lubell-Ames to set up an interview.

Donna and her boss at the station, Dr. Diane Dusick, came to Angel View for a site visit. She was so inspired by what she saw and heard she decided there was too much material for one segment. What began as an idea for a 90-second video grew into a two-part series and the promise of a third.

As part of her research, Donna interviewed staff and toured several homes. At Surnow House, she met and interviewed clients Peter Li and Brandon Stangl, who are featured in the first segment. Peter and Brandon are two of six Surnow clients who are dependent on ventilators because of the impacts of Duchenne muscular dystrophy.

The second segment features our newest program, Angel View Outreach, which assists local families whose children have disabilities, and the Angel View Day Program. In the video, Melissa Acosta, Day Program Administrator, explains that the program's primarily goal is to give clients a daily feeling of accomplishment. Clients are seen doing many of their usual Day Program activities: participating in sports, music, arts and crafts, and wheelchair gardening.

"We are so appreciative of the time Donna and Dr. Dusick spent with us!" says Executive Director Dave Thornton, "and to KCVR for helping spread the word on our mission."

A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



n June, the youngest of my four daughters graduated from high school. As I listened to the commencement speech, I was reminded of a similar occasion more than 30 years ago.

I was sitting on the bleachers at a high school football field. It was a hot day and the sun was glaring. People around me used programs to shield their eyes from the sun and fanned themselves. As one would expect, each speaker recalled events of the high school years and looked toward the future with hope.

When it was the valedictorian's turn, the young man approached the podium, said just a few words, then stopped mid-sentence. He just stood there, looking down at the papers on his podium and then out at the audience. People seemed to look up and pay more attention when he said nothing. Very quickly, the audience became uncomfortable. We were hoping

at any second, he would continue.

I started to cringe as the silence continued. It seemed like an eternity. Just when we thought he'd say something, he picked up his notes, and with head down, walked across the stage and took his seat. Everyone's heart sank. The emcee awkwardly moved on to introduce the next speaker. As the event went on, all we could think about was this poor kid who needed support and encouragement.

But after a few more speeches and without an introduction, the valedictorian stood up, walked across the stage, stood at the podium and said, "Can I try this again?" The crowd burst into applause. The young man gave his speech. The audience went crazy at its conclusion. His actions spoke louder than his words.

To this day, I don't remember what he said. But I do remember the message he delivered through his actions, "Get up, try again, face your fears, people are rooting for you!"

I can honestly say I am equally inspired by the actions of many of Angel View's residents. No matter how difficult life may appear with their multiple disabilities, I've witnessed them "Get up and try again..."

It's a message of hope and determination we can all emulate.

A BETTER SUMMER VACATION

For children with disabilities, a lack of resources and suitable recreational opportunities can put a big damper on the long hot season. To help them have a more therapeutic and stimulating summer, Angel View extended its mini-grant program to cover the cost of sponsorships for activities that are able to accommodate special needs kids. Through Angel View Outreach, nearly 100 children with disabilities were recently granted scholarships so they could participate in summer activities. Outreach Program Manager Amanda Galindo worked with families throughout the desert, helping them access a variety of recreational offerings.

"We provided summer sponsorships so kids could enjoy swimming, bowling, art, martial arts and boxing programs conducted by local organizations," Galindo noted. "We also helped them cover the cost of enrolling their children in programs at Boys and Girls Clubs."

"While researching summer programs for children with disabilities, we learned very few exist!" said Executive Director Dave Thornton. "As a result, one of our ongoing goals will be to work with other local organizations to broaden kids' options."

Typically, it's all about funding since programs for special needs kids require higher staffing ratios. One example is the UCP Skills Builder program. Designed for children with cerebral palsy, autism, Down's syndrome, intellectual disabilities and epilepsy, the program helps participants build their skills in several key areas. UCP operates its Skills Builders program at Boys and Girls Clubs in several valley cities, but a lack of funding had previously stalled the camp in the Eastern Coachella Valley. Sponsorships provided by Angel View Outreach, coupled with funds from other sources, enabled the program to be offered in Mecca.

"It's so important for children with disabilities to have opportunities to have fun and be social," Thornton added. "We're thrilled we were able to lighten the load of so many families this summer."

New Outdoor Therapy Area Cou

lients, supporters, volunteers and staff gathered on May 16 to share the joy as representatives from Angel View and AGC Charities, Inc. cut the ribbon to open a new, wheelchair accessible, outdoor therapy area. The ceremony was the culmination of three months of work by volunteer contractors who selected Angel View for the project among other local charities. AGC Charities, Inc., with leadership by Hensel Phelps Construction Co., rebuilt a very old and relatively unusable courtyard at Angel View's Desert Hot Springs headquarters as part of its series of renovation projects known as Operation Opening Doors.

"Projects like these allow contractors an opportunity to donate their skills to make life a little easier for folks who haven't always been dealt the best hand," said Jim Clemens, chairman of Ocean City, N.J.-based Clemens Construction Co. and chairman of AGC Charities. "The easiest part of these projects is finding contractors that are willing to donate their time and services."

"All work and materials were donated to Angel View free of charge," said Dave Thornton, executive director of Angel View, whose staff prepared and hosted a picnic lunch for the contractors and other guests. "Our clients are truly blessed to have friends like AGC!"

The new outdoor facility gives Angel View another opportunity to provide therapeutic services for children and adults with disabilities. In addition to renovating the courtyard, volunteer contractors replaced doors and wainscot damaged by wheelchairs and installed wainscot in a new wing.


"But that's not all," said Day Program Administrator Melissa Acosta, "in the fall, AGC Charities will also install two sunshades in the courtyard area, which are currently under construction, that will protect clients from too much sun. For the first time, our clients will be able to enjoy outdoor activities that most of us take for granted."

"Even though we all have day jobs, the contractors that have worked on this project really took it to heart," said Joe Prior, the Hensel Phelps project engineer who oversaw the project. "We really wanted to make sure this courtyard was as extraordinary as the people who Angel View serves."

In addition to Hensel Phelps, other local contractors supporting the project included ValleyCrest Lanscape Companies, J&M Concrete Contractors, Alonso Painting, Granite Construction and Brady Companies. The project also received financial support from national AGC members, like Flatiron Construction Corp. and Jim and Lynne Waltze.



For months, there is a buildup of anticipation as caregivers help the Angel View residents shop for prom dresses and special outfits, and decide on hairstyles and accessories. "Each year," says Bronstein, "we seem to add a little something more. This year, Steve Hill volunteered to strum his guitar while Angel View clients came through the double doors of the Demuth Community Center."

The Angel View clients, who attend the prom, are pinned with a special corsage or boutonnière upon entrance. Several volunteers escort party goers to a photographer for a prom portrait. Representatives of the Rotary Club of Palm Springs, Angel View board and administration, along with supporters enjoy an evening of dancing and chatting with the Angel View attendees who are pushed and turned in their wheelchairs to the music and, sometimes, in their gurneys.



IT TAKES A VILLAGE

GRANTS ENABLE EXPANSION OF EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS



Over the years, Angel View has cared for clients with a wide range of intellectual and physical disabilities. Our first mission was assisting children with polio. When vaccines made polio a bad memory for many in the U.S., we began to help children and young adults with developmental disabilities.

More recently, we've seen a growing need for residential care for children and adults with developmental disabilities who are considered medically fragile. To ensure we provide them with the best care possible, we've stepped up our emergency preparedness efforts.

"All of our direct care staff are certified to perform CPR and first aid," explains Bob Carl, R.N., Angel View's staff developer. "And now thanks to grant funds from the Rotary Club of Palm Springs and Edison International, we'll also be able to purchase automated external defibrillators

(AEDs) and certify staff in their use."

The portable devices diagnose potentially life threatening cardiac arrhythmias and provide electrical therapy to allow the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm. Units will be placed at the Angel View Day Program and at homes where our most medically fragile clients live, like Houston House. In addition to enabling us to purchase the AEDs, funds from the Rotary Club of Palm Desert and Edison International allowed us to send two staffers to the American Heart Association Train the Trainer program. Sarah DuShane, R.N., and Michelle Nance, who tracks the CPR certification of our direct care staff, are now qualified CPR trainers. The balance of the grant funds allowed us to purchase much needed new CPR mannequins and workbooks for all who participate.

WHERE THERE'S A WILL, THERE'S A WAY

The situations vary. Sometimes we'll get a call from a senior citizen who says, "I have no heirs but would like to leave my possessions to Angel View."

Other times, the call will be from someone younger. "I don't plan on needing to do this anytime soon," the person will say, "but I'd like to leave my household furnishings to Angel View. What do I need to do?"

Regardless of age, the process for donating personal possessions after death is always the same: the bequest must be stated in a will or trust.

Thanks to our resale stores, which sell gently used merchandise to raise funds for our programs and services, donors who name Angel View in their wills are assured their contributions will go to a great cause. It doesn't matter if the donation is a refrigerator, computer, set of dishes, or clothing – everything finds another home somewhere!

HEALTHY PLANET, HEALTHY YOU



Gifts come from many unexpected places but this one came from the planet to our clients!

As explained by Tricia Gehrlein, Regional Director for The Clinton Health Matters Initiative, "The Clinton Health Matters Initiative (CHMI) works to improve the health and well being of people across the

U.S. and globally by activating individuals, communities and organizations to make meaningful contributions to the health of others. The Coachella Valley is the first community to develop a CHMI regional strategy." Angel View participated along with many other local healthcare related organizations in the development of the Coachella Valley Blueprint for Action.

One of the Bold Steps identified in the community plan is Physical Activity. The overall goal is to ensure that "All residents of the Coachella Valley have access to safe and engaging physical opportunities."

While that's a relatively easy thing to ensure for ambulatory individuals, it's a lot harder to provide to children and adults with disabilities. Enter the 2013 Palm Springs "Mayor's Healthy Planet Healthy You" grant opportunity, provided in conjunction with Desert Healthcare Foundation. The goal of the competitive grant was to address one or more of the Bold Steps outlined in the CHMI Blueprint.

Angel View submitted a proposal to hire a physical activity coordinator whose job it would be to work with various staffers to find and calendar activities that meet our clients' diverse physical capabilities. With children and adults in 19 group homes and at our Day Program, logistics will play a key role in the implementation of this program.

We're thrilled to report our project was funded (thank you again City of Palm Springs and Desert Healthcare Foundation!) and as this newsmagazine was going to press, we hired a very qualified coordinator who will be joining our team in the fall. More on this new program in the next issue.

WELL FARGO FUNDS ENERGY EFFICIENCY UPGRADES

Combine 19 homes and a Day Program with a desert climate and what do you get? High electric bills! Though the Southern California Edison CARE rate provides some relief for group home operators like Angel View, we're always looking for ways to save energy.

In 2012-13, thanks to grants from Jewish Federation of the Desert and Desert Healthcare District, we were able to replace air conditioning units at Joel's House, Friedman House and the Day Program with higher efficiency models. Most recently, a \$5,000 grant from Wells Fargo Foundation is enabling us to continue our cost-saving upgrades.

We greatly appreciate all of our funders' support! Every dollar we don't spend on overhead goes directly to client care.

HELPING LOCAL CHILDREN

Angel View Outreach assists children with disabilities in three key ways. We provide free resources and referrals (and assistance filling out benefits forms and program applications), mileage reimbursement for "medical miles" traveled to access children's healthcare, and mini-grants. The small grants cover the cost of medical equipment, supplies and services not covered by other programs.

Every day, Program Manager Amanda Galindo meets with parents who are helped by Angel View Outreach. Here are a few of their stories:

We recently assisted a family of five from the Coachella area. All four children had Autism or an auditory processing disorder. The mother, who couldn't read or write, was a victim of domestic violence and had lost her trailer in a fire. Since her important documentation was destroyed, she was having a difficult time with the Medi-Cal application. We helped her enroll in Medi-Cal, provided her with additional resources available to low income families, and enrolled her in Angel View TRIP so she would receive mileage reimbursement for the children's healthcare appointments.

· Another mom came to us for assistance with her 10 year old son who suffers from muscular dystrophy. The family had just moved to California and she was unfamiliar with the Regional Center system. We helped him get enrolled and also signed the child up for Angel View TRIP.

The parents of a 13 year old with developmental delays contacted us to see if we could assist. The child, who is nonverbal, has been seeing a therapist to advance his communication abilities. He was making progress at the therapist's office but needed a communication device so he could practice at home. His insurance company declined the device. We were able to purchase it for his family so he could continue to advance his skills.

NEW STORE OPENS IN WILDOMAR

ustomers started lining up under an archway of balloons at the front door of the new Angel View restore in Wildomar an hour before opening. Wildomar is located off I-15 not far from Temecula and near other Angel View stores located in Hemet, Murrieta and Temecula.

On hand to lend support to Angel View resale store number 14 were Angel View General Manager Tracy Powers, Assistant General Manager Shelly Lee, District Manager Alex Burciaga and Public Relations Director DeAnn Lubell-Ames.

According to Powers, it might seem strange for an organization that prides itself on being one of the oldest and most respected charities in the Coachella Valley to want to venture 60 miles from Angel View's main hub.

"The opening of our Wildomar store, our fourth store in Western Riverside County, helps build funding for Angel View's program, not just by adding sales revenue, but also by creating operating efficiencies," Powers said.
